Calendar Description

This course is not recommended for students in certain programs (see the description of STAT 1150). An introduction to the basic principles of statistics and procedures used for data analysis. Topics to be covered include: gathering data, displaying and summarizing data, examining relationships between variables, sampling distributions, estimation and significance tests, inference for means. May not be held with STAT 1001, STAT 1150, STAT 2220. Prerequisite: Any grade 12 or 40S Mathematics, or equivalent.

Teaching Philosophy and Goals

It is the desire of the Department of Statistics to present this course in a manner that emphasizes and illustrates the statistical analysis arising from "real-world" applications. Whenever possible, we will attempt to bring real-life examples and data into the classroom. Upon completion of this course students can proceed in many directions: to further intensive study of statistics, to one or more additional courses in statistics, to the use of statistical methods in other fields of study, or to being a consumer of statistical information in daily life. It is our objective to serve all of these diverse directions.

The course is designed to include basic topics deemed crucial for problem formulation and understanding of the foundations of statistical thinking and reasoning. The concepts of statistical analysis will be stressed. The course will place an emphasis on the development of critical thinking skills.

Software will be used in this course to aid in the analysis of data. The computer program that has been selected for this course, Microsoft Excel, is easy to use and is available free for use with Mac or Windows systems. The program also has many advanced statistical features that you will find useful in subsequent courses.

We are interested in feedback from you. If you can think of ways in which this course could be improved, please let us know.

There is an additional requirement for obtaining a C in the course: to obtain a grade of C or better, you must obtain at least 45% on the final examination.

If you missed Assignment 1, 2 or 3 with a valid reason, the weight of the assignment will be added to your midterm. If you miss Assignment 4, 5 or 6 with a valid reason, the weight of the assignment will be added to your final exam. Your best four of five remaining assignments will count for the remaining portion of the Assignments part of your final grade.

Exam Information

The midterm test will be held **Wednesday**, October 27, from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. It will cover Units 1-5 in the course outline and will consist of only multiple-choice questions. Students missing the midterm test for a valid reason will be permitted to write a deferred midterm at a later date.

The final exam will be 3 hours in duration and will be scheduled by the Registrar's Office. The new final exam period (for strike affected courses) is from January 21 - 23. It will cover Units 1 - 10, with emphasis on Units 6 - 10. The final examination will contain both multiple-choice questions and a written component, in an approximate 75:25 ratio.

The midterm test and the final exam in this course require the use of LockDown Browser and a webcam (using a program called Respondus Monitor). The webcam can be built into your computer or can be the type that plugs in with a USB cable. More detail about the use of LockDown Browser and Respondus Monitor will be given by your instructor.

The midterm test and the final exam are **closed book**. You cannot use the course notes or access any websites, books or any other resources while writing. However, you will be permitted to prepare **two** pages of notes writing only on **one** side of each page (or one double-sided page). You can write notes, formulas, or anything else you want. The notes you write must be prepared by you – you are not permitted to use notes written for you by another student or anyone else.

You are also permitted to use a non-programmable scientific calculator, and any statistical tables provided by your instructor.
